Interpretation Examples (using a score of 6):

For a score of 6: Compared to other adult male sex offenders, Mr. _____'s score is in the 88th percentile. Taking into account that about 7% of sex offenders shared the same score as Mr. ______, the percentile means that roughly 85% of offenders scored lower than Mr. ______, and 8% scored higher.

These percentiles are from 2,011 cases from 4 samples of Canadian sex offenders, which were reweighted to approximate the distribution of all convicted sex offenders in Canada.
